Like schools around the world, both AU staff and students have been challenged to gain new skills in online teaching and learning. This has kept Jane and I plenty busy with classes, and online exams.

Access to internet has been a severe challenge to many of our AU students. When students from Larry's Crop Production class left campus, half of them said that their home situation and finances would make it difficult for them to take online classes and exams. Yet, last week, every one of them submitted their final exam online as expected. We are quite sure that the struggle was not easy, but the Information Technology office helped them to access discounted data time. Amazing what can be done when focused!

The Zimbabwe government recently announced that Grade schools and high schools can open in phases, starting with Exam classes, Grades 7, 11 and 13. Universities can plan to open for final-year classes. How that will work for us when the August term is supposed to begin is still being worked out.

The lockdown, combined with mandatory quarantines for returning residents, and increasing testing, has helped keep the confirmed corona infection rate low. Last count was 149, with four deaths, in a nation of 15 million. Most of the positive cases were residents returning from overseas. We are thankful that as of this writing, Manicaland (the province where we are located) so far has only 9 cases, and those are in quarantine camps for returning residents.

### **AU FARM NEWS**

The farm manager and his staff have not slowed down during the lockdown. Most of the wheat is now sown and starting to germinate. The pumping system and irrigation pumps all received much-needed new equipment- having money available in the Farm Development Fund when needed made a huge difference.

Despite all the challenges brought on by a fragile Zimbabwe economy and now the corona virus, A.U. continues to reach out in Jesus' name, training young people for an uncertain future.
